Dear Dr. Rudolph,

In 2020, the Mountain View Whisman School District Board of Trustees voted to rename Frank L. Huff Elementary in order to ensure all school names in the district aligned with the values of inclusivity and social justice. It has been the distinct pleasure of the Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) to dedicate themselves to the process of renaming Frank L. Huff Elementary School over the past year.

The CAC, composed of Huff's principal, teachers, staff members, parents, students, and alumni convened 7 times over the past year. Using detailed community input from Huff's parent community through the use of the ThoughtExchange platform, the CAC crafted and perfected a rubric that was used to score each namesake candidate put forth.

Through the rubric formation process, we learned that Huff families valued namesake candidates that *elicit a feeling of pride, represent the diversity of the Huff community*, and that are *inspiring and represent the awe associated with bravery and perseverance*. Along with these considerations, members of the CAC determined using the district's mission and vision statements that MVWSD wants a namesake candidate that *represents inclusivity, is symbolic of greater society change and growth, and represents academic excellence and achievement*. Using these parameters, the CAC collected and vetted namesake candidates and used the rubric to make difficult decisions regarding distilling the list of namesake finalists.

In the final stages of the year-long Huff renaming project, the final three namesake candidates emerged: Katherine Johnson, Ruth Bader Ginsbrug, and Amy Imai. Information about the lives and legacies of these candidates, along with the scoring rubrics developed by the CAC, were presented to multiple MVWSD leadership organizations including the Leadership Team, Mountain View Education Foundation (MVEF), PTA Executive Board, and the District Advisory Committee (DAC). Once the scores were collected and averaged, Amy Imai was the



namesake candidate who garnered the most support from these organizations with Katherine Johnson closely behind.

Students of Frank L. Huff Elementary were also involved in the renaming process. Library technician Doreen Kalb met with every classroom to introduce each candidate to students and read books about the lives and experiences of each candidate. This meaningful instruction culminated in individual classrooms voting for the candidate they thought would best represent the values and virtues of the school community. As a result of the voting process, 68.4% of classrooms supported Amy Imai as the next namesake of Frank L. Huff Elementary school.

Given the overwhelming support for Amy Imai from the community along with her deeply compelling history of courage, resilience in the face of hardship, bravery, and service to her community, the CAC is delighted to provide our enthusiastic recommendation of ***Amy Imai Elementary School*** for the next name of what was formerly Frank L. Huff Elementary School in the Mountain View Whisman School District. Along with the support of the CAC, you will find remarks from the community attached to this letter.

Community members including family, friends, students, and witnesses to the life of Amy Imai wrote to the district and described Amy as “selfless”, “humble”, “generous with her time,” and as someone who “had boundless energy and love for helping her community.” Her younger brother Arthur noted that Amy has “positively touched the lives of all who knew or encountered her.” “During a well-lived lifetime,” others wrote, “She put her whole heart into serving the Mountain View community she loved, especially towards educating children on what it means to be informed by history, the importance of being an active citizen and how to be guided by an open mind & compassion for others.”

Those in support of Ms. Imai as the next namesake candidate also talked about Amy’s personal history of having been relocated to an internment camp at Heart Mountain in Wyoming during World War II. Her subsequent community activism through storytelling and educating young people in the community about the perils of prejudice seems to meet the current moment with particular relevance. It is without reservation that we make this recommendation to you today.

Re: Huff Elementary School Renaming

As a younger brother of Amy Imai, I am honored that her name is being considered for the renaming of Huff Elementary. I feel she is very deserving of the honor as she was Mountain View in spirit and heart.

Our family were residents of Mountain View until our Interment at Heart Mountain Relocation Camp in Wyoming. Upon returning to California from the Camp we had to settle in Cupertino and started the sharecropping of berries. My mother could not handle the transition from camp, so Amy started taking care of my younger sister Kathleen and myself. I was eight, Kathleen was one and Amy was only fifteen.

Because of all this added responsibility Amy was unable to go to high school until her sophomore year. The principal initially thought that she would need to spend an extra year but she was able to meet the requirements and graduate with her class. She did so well in her studies that she became her class Valedictorian.

After graduating high school, she was offered a scholarship to San Jose State. My father, however, did not want her to go as he felt it would not be of use to her because she would eventually "just get married". Amy followed my father's wishes. About that time my older brother George wanted to go to college. My father was once again against it. Amy was able to convince my father that she would work the farm with him until George graduated college. George was able to graduate Cal Poly San Luis Obispo due to this effort.

Amy met and married Robert Imai and the couple resided for life in Mountain View. They raised four children and grew carnations at their Ada Avenue home. Amy was very devoted to her children and would instill them with strong religious based values of right and wrong. She also raised them to have pride in and support for their community.

Amy was a tireless woman who worked hard growing carnations as well as any other effort she undertook. She instilled her work ethic and strong Buddhist values to her family and to others.

I remember the time she organized a conference at the Buddhist Church to present other religions to a forum. She asked people of the Jewish, Catholic and Protestant denominations to share some of their religion's main themes. It was very interesting, that even some time ago she was aware that we need to live in harmony with all religions.

Another example of her love of Mountain View was when the Buddhist Church in San Jose wanted the church of Mountain View to be called 'San Jose Buddhist Church, Mountain View'. Amy was against this proposal and she endorsed that the church be called Mountain View Buddhist Church, the name it holds to this day.

Amy was not only concerned with people of all faiths but also all pets and other animals. In the days we were strawberry farming our mother wanted the stray cats to be moved because they were doing damage to the strawberries. My mom asked Amy to round up the strays and move them miles away. Amy reluctantly did as my mother asked but I later saw her crying. Subsequently the mother cat came back to the farm and did not want to leave. Amy then took care of her.

She continued her love of pets for the rest of her life. When Amy passed away her dogs seemed to know that she was not coming back. A short time later her dogs also passed away as if knowing that they could join her and she would lovingly take care of them forever.

Amy was always a very giving person and her support of the Buddhist Church of Mountain View was monumental. She organized trips for the aged church members to Japan and Europe as well as to Reno. When there was a funeral at the Church she would take charge of the post ceremony funeral meal. This would allow the family to be free to reminisce with those attending about the people who had passed away.

Her contribution to the city of Mountain View was tremendous. Her children all went to Whisman District schools and Amy was a big participant in the PTA and other school activities.

She positively touched the lives of all who knew or encountered her. I feel it would be a great honor to recognize my sister and name a school after her. Amy represented all that is good about Mountain View. She was part of a Mountain View from its agricultural past all the way into its change into being part of Silicon Valley. Amy represented and never forgot the roots of this city.

I feel it would benefit the Whisman schools to honor Amy as she was not only part of the schools but of Mountain View. I feel she perfectly embodies the districts motto of Inspiring Each Student to Succeed Every Day.

I am writing regarding the renaming of Huff School. It is without hesitation that I offer my enthusiastic support for Amy Imai. In the interest of full disclosure, I am married to her son, Darren.

From the moment I met Amy, it was obvious she placed a high priority on education and achievement. As she and her husband were carnation growers, income was limited. However, they still managed to put 4 children through college. It was extremely important to Amy, in particular. She knew it would give them a broader perspective of the world, and opportunities for a better life.

Amy also encouraged participation in school clubs and activities, as well as church and community organizations. Her children were all active in athletics, as well. She knew the skills they learned through these pursuits would make them well-rounded, and give them the necessary resources to succeed later in life.

Amy's enthusiasm did not end with her family. When she worked at Lucky's, she encouraged her young co-workers to work hard in school and get engaged in community activities. She even played matchmaker for two of them. They are now married and teaching English in Japan. They had such high regard for her, that they flew all the way from Japan for her funeral service.

It is no secret that Amy and her family spent several years at the Heart Mountain, Wyoming internment camp during WWII. Although it was not a pleasant experience, they made the best of it. She wanted people to understand why the treatment of the Japanese people was unjust, so that such events would not be repeated. When 9/11 happened, and hate crimes against those of Middle Eastern descent were occurring, she was very concerned that history would be repeated. Over her lifetime, she made it her mission to speak at schools, libraries, and other venues to educate others on the dangers of injustice.

In summary, Amy believed that a well-educated populace would help eliminate prejudice and injustice. This is particularly relevant in today's world. She encouraged others to get involved in their communities, as she did, to be a positive catalyst for change and advancement.

Dear Honorable MVWSD Trustees,

I am writing to express my support for selecting Amy Imai as the new namesake for Huff Elementary School.

In all transparency, Amy was my aunt, my father's older sister. Having grown up in New Jersey, I was not fortunate enough to know Amy well during my childhood. My first-hand recollections of her came from a few summer vacations to California to visit my father's extended family. But in our house in New Jersey, Auntie Amy was legendary.

My father, who was 7 years younger than Amy, spoke highly about how she had raised his younger sister and him in the internment camp during World War II and after the war while his parents and older brother worked on the farm. My father had respected her selflessness and fortitude as she juggled many responsibilities as a student, the primary caregiver of her younger siblings, and head of household. As a high school student who was very focused on my own academic achievement, I could hardly believe that Amy was able to graduate near the top of her high school class and still be so active in school and her Buddhist temple. Yet Amy never had the chance to go to college and pursue further academic or professional opportunities. Amy's teenage years was, indeed, a different time from mine, and in that moment, her priorities were to take care of her family.

After graduating from college and starting my career, my husband and I decided to move to the Bay Area in 1997 to be closer to family. It was then when I truly started to appreciate and admire Amy's moral character and impact that she had on our family and community. During family get-togethers, Amy shared stories about her life in Heart Mountain and back in the Bay Area after they had returned home. Also, through the photos and bits of information that she had collected over the years, she passed down our family history, which went back to Hawai'i in the late 19th century.

Whenever Amy spoke about her experience in the internment camp, she never talked about it with anger or resentment. She was able to impart her memories and bring life to her personal experience through funny, bittersweet anecdotes of things that happened and the people she grew up with. She demonstrated her incredible ability to tell stories with so many of the people around her, and later I found out that she had been passing down those stories at local community events, schools, and in documentaries all in the hope that future generations would never forget the injustice that Japanese Americans faced during her time.

Leading a very humble, down-to-earth life, Amy and her husband, Robert, ran a carnation business while they raised four children. Before permanently retiring, she also worked in the deli at a supermarket. Despite these demands, she was generous with her time and had boundless energy and love for helping her community. She taught at the Dharma School at her Buddhist temple, ran the flower and plant booth at its annual Obon Festival, organized meals for funerals of congregation members, and volunteered in the student exchange

program with Mountain View's sister city, Iwata, Japan. And no matter what walk of life you came from or what language you spoke, Amy made anybody who walked through her door feel welcome – through great food, lively conversation, and laughter. Amy was always at the ready to help someone in need and lift their spirits with her kind smile, and she never expected anything in return. And what is even more amazing is that her kindness and generosity live on as her children and grand-children embody the same values as their beloved mother and grandmother.

I did not fully appreciate the extent of Amy's social impact until, sadly, her death. She passed away on New Year's Eve 2013, on the day that she would have spent hours preparing Japanese food for the upcoming holiday gatherings with friends and family. Her funeral was held at the Mountain View Buddhist Temple, and I was astounded at the sheer number of people who came to pay their respects. The temple was so filled with mourners that they set up the auditorium across the main hall as an overflow section and broadcast the service on closed-circuit television. The poor minister must have chanted for two hours non-stop while hundreds of people lined up and completed the funeral ritual of bowing at the altar and burning incense. It was an eye-opening, surreal experience for my husband, my two young children, and me. I was truly moved by the outpouring of love and respect from so many people in the local community for my dear Auntie Amy.

I want to impress on you how very proud and grateful for Amy's nomination and selection as one of the finalists. While we can never know what she would think about this honor if she were alive, I can only imagine that she would be extremely humble about the matter. At the same time, I also imagine that Amy would be very pleased that in 2021, any Asian American – whether it was herself or somebody else – could be recognized publicly for her dedication towards educating future generations and serving the community. While I respect the achievements of the other finalists, I urge you to consider the impact of selecting Amy Imai as the new namesake. Except for her time in Heart Mountain, Amy spent most of her life in Mountain View and dedicated her life's work to making a difference. Renaming Huff Elementary School after Amy Imai would be a strong message of support for our local Asian American community and symbolic of the greater social change we all hope to come.

I had the pleasure of meeting Amy Imai during the Mountain View Buddhist Temple's Obon festival. She was working the flower booth with her family and we had a chance to talk. Mrs. Imai was always inclusive and very family oriented. I later discovered she had you tube videos of her experience while she lived in a Japanese relocation camp. I watched her speaking to others and her community about how she felt and the lifelong impact the relocation camp had on her and her family. She shared how she watched over her little sister and helped raise her, her hardships about being relocated and as I watched, I couldn't help to think how I would feel if that had happened to me. My thoughts were that I would be angry even many years later and that sharing my story would serve for others to feel my anger and pain. Amy did not share her stories in this manner. She maintained her dignity, her pride for her flower business and her hard work ethic. The more I listened to her stories, the more my admiration grew. She was not angry instead she was relatable. Amy was not bitter, instead she displayed poise throughout her struggles. Mrs. Imai was truly an exemplary woman that never allowed her traumatic experiences to overshadow who she genuinely was. Amy was respectful, hardworking, honest and inclusive. My hope is that if she gets chosen for the renaming of Huff School, that it will create a spark of curiosity in others to research the legacy of Amy Imai and it will inspire people to just BE BETTER.

I am the librarian at Huff School. I'd like to thank Martha and Alexxa Kovacs for their letters and add to their comments. I had the wonderful experience of talking to each of the Huff classes about the three candidates being considered for the renaming of Huff School.

While in the past we have read books about both Ruth Bader Ginsburg and Katherine Johnson and are familiar with their life accomplishments, many of us didn't know the details behind Amy Imai's background. I spent time over spring break trying to track down any of Amy's relatives and was thrilled to connect with both her daughter and daughter-in-law.

I was provided with many details about Amy's life that I could share with the Huff students when I presented. The students had many questions. For most of them, it was the first time they had heard about the internment camps. It sparked important discussions - discussions that, (as the Kovacs pointed out), Amy engaged in with many students and adults during her lifetime.

We talked about the fact that Amy's mission was to educate people so that an injustice like what happened to Japanese Americans during WWII in the U.S. would not happen again to any family. Many students are now reading about the internment camps as a result of our discussion.

You might not know that Amy was a leader for 35 years in the Mountain View Sister City which is a student exchange program with Iwata, Japan and Hasselt, Belgium and she instilled its importance in her family and the community. She felt it was important that students have the opportunity to experience other cultures, learn about our differences and become culturally tolerant. Amy's family continues to play important roles in this program.

As I talked to Huff classes, we were surprised to discover that Amy and her family had many connections with others at Huff and in our community! For instance, Amy shares a relative with one of our teachers! A long term substitute teacher at Huff told me she attended school with two of Amy's children and also served as Girl Scout Leaders with Amy's daughter-in-law. I found out that another Huff teacher's wife teaches at MVHS along with Amy's daughter (also a teacher). I even learned that Amy taught my friend's children at the MV Buddhist Temple for years. I was very surprised to find out that my son attended MVHS with Amy's granddaughter!

Students were excited to hear Amy once lived right behind Huff School's location and that her family attended schools that their own siblings now attend. They enjoyed hearing stories about Amy. A favorite was: When 9/11 happened, Amy was very concerned that the Muslim community not be treated the way the Japanese were treated after Pearl Harbor. She worked within the community to fold 1000 cranes and form them into a US flag to send a message to Washington as a reminder for healing and that we must be tolerant. Norman Mineta took the piece to the capitol.

I want to thank the Imai family and the Kovac family for sharing their insights with us. Clearly Amy's service to our community has touched many lives. The Imai family is firmly rooted in our community and has continued her legacy.

Amy Imai was a long-time resident of Mountain View. Her four children attended Mountain View public schools and she volunteered at their schools and at their after school activities.

She was a member of the Mountain View Buddhist Temple and a board member of the Mountain View Sister Cities Student Exchange Program when I met her in the late 1970's.

Amy was a tireless volunteer. She actively participated in Sister Cities because she believed that it was a great opportunity for the selected high school exchange students to experience living in a different culture with a host family.

At the temple, she volunteered for numerous activities. Her most memorable achievement was volunteering to help any bereaved family with the funeral reception. According to temple policy, the family was responsible for the reception. She met with the family to decide on a menu and how many people would attend. The family was responsible for the cost of the food, paper products and the eating utensils. She took responsibility for planning and coordinating the rest: setting up tables and chairs; ordering some food while preparing other foods; and cleaning up when done. I watched her on a televised panel discussion and later asked her why she does it. Her reply was that she knew the younger generations did not learn about the internment camps. She wanted them to remember so hopefully it would never happen again.

It is remarkable what she accomplished during her lifetime but I only knew her in the last 35 years of her 83-year life.
