

Participation History



Background

Prior to the pandemic, we participated in the below programs.

- National School Lunch Program (NSLP)
- Child & Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)
- Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) "Summer Seamless"
- Catering, Food Truck, and Partnerships
 School meals were provided at three tiers, paid, reduced, and free based on family income.

Changes Since COVID

 When schools moved to remote learning, we entered Summer Seamless which is managed by the Federal Government (March 2020).

 Historically this was only offered during the summer months, but due to pandemic it was extended past the summer months.

Flexibility of Summer Seamless


- Serve meals to children that were able to be taken home.
- Allowed districts to serve all students regardless of free and reduced status and receive reimbursement.
- Flexibility in nutritional requirements due to supply chain issues.
- No need to track the names of children.

Current Status

- California is one of two states that has decided to continue a feeding program, regardless of the Federal Government.
- To qualify for free meals, a family of three must earn less than \$30,000 to qualify. This will not apply in California and MVWSD.
- This summer we will only be able to provide food at locations where over 50% of children are eligible (Castro) due to Federal rules.



Labor vs. Food Cost

- Current labor cost is 68% of revenue.
- Our current food and supplies cost is 53% of revenue.
 - Standard labor and food costs should be about 40%-45% of revenue each according to Financial Crisis and Management Assistance Team (FCMAT)

Meals Per Labor Hour (MPLH)

- FCMAT suggests 30 MPLH (pre-made menu)
- MVWSD is at 25.56 MPLH (mix of from-scratch and pre-packaged)
 - To address this we need to
 - increase the number of meals served at sites
 - consider taking on outside meal service with other districts.



Meal Prices

Audit

During our last audit in 2020, the auditor stated that we needed to increase our paid meal cost to be at least the reimbursement rate.

 Free and reduced meals should not supplement our paid meals.

Current Meal Prices

Breakfast

- Paid \$2.50
- Reduced \$0.30
- Free \$0.00
- Adults \$3.00

Lunch

- Paid \$3.50
- Reduced \$0.40
- Free \$0.00
- Adults \$4.50
- Students have not paid in two years

Current Cost Per Meal

- 2019-20 Average cost per meal (before COVID shutdown) \$4.67
- 2020-21 Average cost per meal was \$6.25
- 2021-22 Average cost per meals is \$4.59
 (July-December)- dropped due to scale
- Projected cost for 2022-23 will be \$5.95 based on current conditions.
 - The District's general fund supplements the cost of every meal.
 - In order to continue to receive reimbursement (National School Lunch Program) MVWSD needs to raise the cost of our paid meals

Options to Consider

Breakfast

- Paid \$ 3.50_(\$1.00 increase)
- Reduced \$.40 (\$0.10 increase)
- Adults \$ 4.00_{(\$1.00}
 increase)

*The reduced price meal cost is set at the Federal level

Lunch

- Paid \$5.50(\$2.00 increase)
- Reduced \$.40_(same)
- Adults \$6.50(\$2.00 increase)



Current Constraints

Issues our Child Nutrition Program Faces

- Staffing
 - Similar to all service fields, our Child Nutrition program is struggling with finding reliable staffing.
- Supply chain disruptions
 - Example: when we put in an order for 50 cases of chicken nuggets, 1 case is delivered.
- Increased costs for materials
 - Paper trays went from \$51.00 to \$107.00 per unit.
 - Vendors are now charging fuel cost.

Food Costs Have Increased

- 7.4% increase from January 2021 to January 2022 (USDA).
- Globally food prices have risen at the fastest pace in 41 years.
 - 20.7% increase across the globe.
- Local produce has risen over 18%.
- Fresh fruit and vegetables have doubled in price.

Current Menu Offerings

- At the middle school, stations are set up around campus.
- Due to how meals are packaged, we must give all five components of the meal for it to be reimbursable.

Moving Back to MUR Distribution

Positives

- More choice for students
- Less food waste

Challenges

- Longer lines due to 2 times more students needing to queue and find lunch cards
- Children will need more help getting lunch card
- Finding a way to serve approximately 50% more students within 15 minutes in comparison to pre-pandemic times



Recommendations and Next Steps

Getting Back to Normal Service

- In alignment with District COVID protocols, we recommend a return to indoor food service when we return to indoor dining which will include more choice for students.
- This could be done as early as April 4th based on Board direction.
- Choice will include an entree choice and 3 of 5 components.

Recommendations

- Increase the paid price of lunch
 - \$5.50 for students
 - \$6.50 for adults
- Increase the paid price of breakfast
 - + \$3.50 for students
 - \$4.00 for adults

- The changes will go into effect next school year
- For the next two years meals will be free to all students due to the State.
