




## **Lessons Learned**

Challenges presented by urbanization are best addressed by broad-based, collaborative community partnerships.

Joint use agreements between schools and communities are a promising way to increase physical activity opportunities for under-served communities.

A Bottom-Up / Top-Down approach helps mobilize the political will necessary for district-wide implementation.



### Who We Are

Learning Landscapes builds school yards that support the wellness of communities - increasing community gathering places, providing recreational opportunities, open space, gardens, and much more. Each new school yard is tailored to the local community with the goal of increasing children's physical activity, increasing neighborhood gathering places, and beautifying the neighborhood.

Learning Landscapes is a program of the Colorado Center for Community Development at the University of Colorado Denver's College of Architecture and Planning.

## Methodology



- 3) School principals and parents lobby District administrators to construct the school-yards, and local businesses, organizations, and community-members provide funding and in-kind support (bottom-up approach)
- 4) Office of Economic Development, School District, and Public Foundations provide funding through grants and gifts (top-down approach)

## **Key Results**

- 81 school yards completed
   24 additional school yards to be completed by 2015
   \$49.6 million raised for school yards
