Canopy Update

Background

- At the November 7th, 2024 meeting, the Board approved a \$20,000 contract with Canopy to plant trees ahead of the Outdoor Learning Project.
- Since the initial Board approval, Canopy, the District and the City have gathered feedback from parents, staff, and community.
- The City has partnered with the District and Canopy by providing their support as well as offering to adjust irrigation for the trees.





Benefits of Trees in Schools

- Schoolyards offer a rare and significant opportunity for adapting to a changed climate
- Planting trees in schoolyards cools the immediate environment, provides essential shade, improves air quality, and creates more inviting spaces for children to engage with nature.

- A well-shaded campus can reduce surface temperatures by as much as 20 degrees Fahrenheit
- Trees cool the air around them by about 7 degrees
- In this dense urban matrix, foresting schools can not only mean that we're doing right by the students and teachers on campus, but by the communities neighboring them

Why this Matters



Next Steps

- Canopy has identified end of April/beginning of May to hold the planting and community engagement day – before planting season ends.
- After trees are planted, Canopy will provide tree care for the next 3 years for the 15 trees planted.

Long Term Partnership Possibilities

- The district and Canopy are exploring a long term partnership for all school sites that is similar to Bubb's pilot.
- Canopy ISA-certified arborist staff member dedicated to MVWSD urban forest that:
 - Coordinates hands on fieldwork for students and community members at volunteer engagement events
 - Position would be deeply embedded with school staff to ensure cooperation and knowledge sharing/maintenance staff training
 - Engages with community to conduct a district-wide tree inventory
 - Conducts annual health and replacement assessments
